Energy Security, an agenda in Asia

- Growing oil import dependence of the region
- Emerging large-scale importers (China, India, etc.)
- Oil price increase after 1999
- Impact of September 11
- War in Iraq and potential instability in the Middle East
- Growing attention to "Geopolitical aspects" of energy

Energy Policy To Enhance Energy Security

- Unilateral Approach (by individual country)
 - Energy Source Diversification
 (Promotion of Natural gas, Coal, Nuclear, etc.)
 - Oil Import Source Diversification
 - Oil Stockpile Buildup
 - Overseas Upstream Investment
 - Etc.
- Regional Cooperation

Importance of Regional Cooperation

- Understanding that energy security is a common challenge for Asia
- Cooperation can be beneficial:
 - Synergies
 - Optimal use of existing resources, capital, technology, know-how, infrastructure, etc.
 - Bargaining power
 - From "national energy market" to "regional energy market"
 - Efficiency
 - New business opportunity

International Cooperation in Asia

- Cooperation in North Eat Asia
- Cooperation in ASEAN + 3 (Japan, Korea and China)
- Cooperation in ASEAN

Cooperation in North East Asia

- Bilateral dialogue and cooperation (incl. Japan-Korea FTA talk).
- Seminar, workshop, etc. to facilitate regional cooperation.
- "North East Asia Petroleum Forum" on November 5-6, 2003
 - Common recognition on the issue of "Asia Premium"
 - Cooperation for oil stockpiling
 - Best utilization of existing infrastructure (refining capacity)
 - Promotion of natural gas market

Cooperation in ASEAN +3

- During the 8th IEF in Osaka, energy ministers of ASEAN + 3 met for the first time to discuss agenda for future cooperation.
- The ministers agreed on such issues as: creation of emergency network; initiative of oil stockpile development; joint study on the Asian oil market; etc.
- Forum will be created to discuss the above topics.

Recent ASEAN +3 Forum

- Oil Market Forum and Oil Stockpile Forum were held in Bangkok, Thailand on November 13-14, 2003.
- Participants (government officials and experts) agreed that "Asia Premium" is common issues for the region and that pursuit of concerted efforts is important.
- The importance of oil stockpile was also recognized. The Forum appreciate the effort to strengthen oil stockpile and other emergency measures in individual countries and ASEAN as a region (revision of APSA)

Cooperation in ASEAN

- Review of ASEAN Petroleum Security Agreement (APSA)
- MOU for Trans ASEAN Gas Pipeline (TAGP)
- MOU for Trans ASEAN Power Grid (TAPG)

Importance of cooperation between East and West Asia (Middle East)

Middle East needs Asia because:

- Growing market for their most important commodity
- Crucial needs for stable and sufficient revenue flows for their sustainable development

Common Interests for Asia and the Middle East

- Asia countries need sufficient energy supply at reasonable prices to meet their growing energy requirement (Energy Supply Security)
- Middle East needs markets for their energy commodity to secure stable and sufficient revenue flows (Energy Demand Security)
- To achieve sustainable development, it is essential for the two region to have a better understanding of the interdependency and pursue the common interests

Conclusion

- Pressed by the growing energy import dependence, North East Asia is now embarking on strategy development to enhance energy supply security
- Pursuit of energy security by individual countries is expected to contribute to enhance regional and global energy security.
- Asian countries are enhancing regional energy cooperation to address the common challenges
- Intra/Inter regional cooperation should be promoted for the benefit of regional and global economic development and prosperity
